

Title: Double Counting (Overlapping)	Policy No: 1.6

Policy Statement: Double counting or allowing courses to overlap from one area to another will be permitted in the following undergraduate degree components:

- multiple degrees (including dual degrees),
- double (or multiple) majors;
- multiple minors;
- a major and a minor;
- the university core course/general education and a major and/or a minor.

A course may not count in more than one area/core of the general education/university core.

Double counting is not allowed between the General Studies major and another major or minor. Double counting is also not allowed between the Professional Teacher Education (PTE) component and the corresponding major requirements of the degree.

This policy does not reduce the total number of hours in general university requirements, i.e., total hours required, upper-division hours.

Background: For years, UCO has not allowed students to count courses for multiple purposes. This has resulted in students being discouraged from certain academic pursuits.

Courses in the PTE section can be used in General Education (such as IME 3312) and also in any minor requirements.

Purpose: Provide opportunities for students to earn additional credentials associated with their degree in a shortened time frame.
